making her way steadly north and east towards Cadiz. During her passage from Lanzarote towards the mainland of Europe. she will be passing

over various Seamounts. including the Vasco da Gama Seamount, and the Josephine Seamount, which has a height from the seabed of nearly five thousand metres; a similar height to Mont Blanc, in the Alps.

Thursday 11th November 2021 From the Navigator.

As Queen Elizabeth made landfall in the early hours of this morning, her sea passage from the Canary Islands came to an end. Today she finds herself, once again, alongside in a port with a rich maritime heritage. As well as the port and various military buildings with links to the Spanish Navy, you may also see the Admiral's House. A house built for the Admiral of the Spanish treasure fleet; a convoy system of sea routes, which linked Spain with its territories in the Americas across the Atlantic. Early this morning Queen Elizabeth embarked her pilot and made her way slowly through the breakwaters into the port limits. She secured herself alongside, where she will remain for the day.



Friday 12th November, 2021 our sixth visit

From the Navigator,

This morning the Queen Elizabeth made her way from the Atlantic Ocean, into the River Tagus. The local pilot was boarded at the entrance before Queen Elizabeth passed under the 'Ponte 25 de Abril' rail and road bridge. The 'Ponte 25 de Abril' is the seventeenth targest suspension bridge in the world, with a total length of 2.277 metres. Queen Elizabeth will also pass the Padrão dos Descobrimentos: a monument on the northern bank of the Tagus River estuary. It is located along the river where ships departed to explore and trade with India and the Orient, the monument celebrates

the Portuguese Age of Discovery during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries.



As usual, the shuttle bus from the cruise terminal drops us off in the main city square, Praca dos Restauradores, immediately by the former cinema, the Eden Teatro which opened in 1931.

Our route passes many of the locations we have seen many times before - such as the statue to the workers who constructed the many stone set pavements then on to the Praça de D. Pedro IV and the railway station.

Estação de Caminhos de Ferro do Rossio (Rossio Train Station) built between 1886 and 1887 by order of the Portuguese Royal Railway Company.

The station, then called the Estação Central (Central Station) would make the connection between Lisbon and Sintra. The tunnel through which trains must pass in order to get to the Rossio Train Station was deemed, at the time of its construction, and today even, a marvel of engineering.

The effigies of António Maria de Fontes Pereira de Melo (a Portuguese statesman and engineer) and Britain's George Stephenson are in the centre of the facade.

In the early hours of tomorrow morning Queen Elizabeth will embark her local pilot at the Nab Tower, and make approaches to her berth in Southampton.
